OCVA debuts Travel Impact Calculator, and more

New Travel Impact Calculator tool for visitors

The Oregon Coast Visitors Association (OCVA) has launched a new <u>Travel</u> <u>Impact Calculator</u> to help visitors to the Oregon Coast determine and mitigate the carbon impact of their travel through a donation to a coastal stewardship nonprofit. The calculator can be found on OCVA's website, thepeoplescoast.com, under "Be Kind to the Coast."

Carbon dioxide emissions are linked to <u>changing climate</u>, a key concern for Oregon Coast communities. OCVA's calculator and voluntary donation system are part of its Mitigation, Adaptation and Resiliency Plan, adopted in 2022.

OCVA's travel impact calculator estimates carbon emissions resulting from visitor transportation, including air travel, vehicle travel, and public transit. Visitors who use the calculator input their travel distance and miles per gallon or vehicle type to calculate their approximate emissions.

The tool then offers visitors the opportunity to mitigate their calculated impact by making a donation to the <u>Tillamook Estuaries Partnership</u> (TEP), an environmental nonprofit doing work to capture carbon and care for the environment.

Coastal estuaries mitigate carbon emissions by sequestering carbon, or pulling it out of the atmosphere. Voluntary visitor donations will help support TEP's native plant nursery, which provides coastally-adapted stock for environmental restoration projects along the entire Oregon Coast.

If you have an upcoming coastal event, you are welcome to share the calculator with participants. This is one way to incorporate sustainability into your event and encourage visitors to give back to the Coast.

Wildfire prevention for fire season

Over the last several weeks, the <u>Oregon Department of Forestry</u> (ODF) has recognized an uptick in human-caused wildfires. ODF hopes that with understanding and cooperation, human-caused fires do not continue progressing.

With dry fuels, higher temperatures and low humidity, now is the time for Oregonians to actively practice wildfire prevention.

Fires in the outdoors start for several reasons (vehicles, campfires, smoking, cutting, grinding and welding metal, power saw use, fireworks, electric fences, mowing dry grass, etc). Years of research has found that these activities are prone to start fires when vegetation dries out, humidity drops, and temperatures rise.

"We all need to do our part to prevent wildfires from starting throughout the year, but right now everyone needs to be extremely careful," says ODF Fire Protection Chief, Mike Shaw. "With the current conditions, just one spark, cigarette, or open flame could result in Oregon's next wildfire. Preventing fires from starting helps protect our firefighters and communities from the health, safety, and economic impacts of wildfires and smoke."

What does actively practicing wildfire prevention mean? It means:

• <u>Check your local fire regulations</u>. Public use and industry restrictions are put in place to help prevent wildfires. By following these regulations, you can help reduce the risk of a human-caused wildfires.

- Recreate responsibly. If allowed, only build campfires in approved campgrounds and make sure your campfire is OUT COLD before leaving. If campfires are banned, consider using a camp stove.
- Check your vehicle. Servicing your car regularly helps reduce the risk of a faulty part throwing sparks into dry grass while you're driving. Also, make sure to not park or idle over dry grass if you pullover. The heat from your undercarriage or exhaust could ignite the grass below.
- Keep a fire extinguisher on hand. Keep one in your car just in case you need it while traveling.
- Don't burn debris. Debris burning is prohibited across Oregon during fire season.
