Reflections on community building in the Applegate Valley



Near the Oregon-California border, the winding Applegate River carves out the Applegate Valley. The state highway 238 follows the tributary's course on its way to join with the Rogue River. Unincorporated communities dot the path through the watershed, its 500 square miles spreading across three counties and two states.

Prior to forming [A Greater Applegate](#), the area's leading community building organization, the overlap of geography and government agencies challenged residents' sense of shared identity. It made advocating for their needs difficult. The area lacked health clinics, public transportation, public services, reliable internet and cell phone service, and had little voice in land use.

"People in Oregon don't know where the Applegate is — particularly people who might be making decisions about us," shares community builder, Seth Kaplan.

This video recounts the lessons learned and is filled with the pride of two long-time community builders in the Applegate Valley region. Listen for inspiration, familiarity, and the comfort of knowing that while community building takes time — it's worth it.

Important updates for students applying for federal financial aid

Changes this year to the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) affect the way students apply for and are awarded federal financial aid. These changes have also affected financial aid applications for undocumented students, the ORSAA (Oregon) and CADAA (California).

With promises of a shorter application, streamlined eligibility guidelines, and more aid eligibility, the changes are expected to encourage more students from all backgrounds to apply.

The new FAFSA, ORSAA and CADAA applications will be available by December 31, 2023. Learn more about how the updated FAFSA affects the students in your life at the link below.

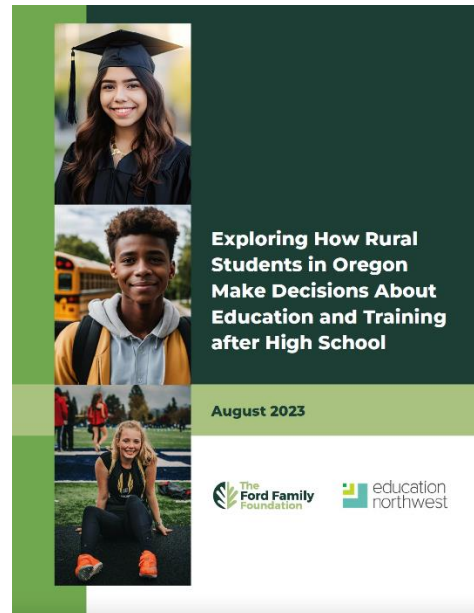

Understanding rural student pathways

Rural students make up nearly half of all high school graduates in Oregon, but a [previous report](#) found they enroll and complete college at lower rates than urban students.

What factors influence rural students' decisions about their academic and career goals? In the graduating class of 2018-19, only 42 percent of rural students enrolled immediately in college after high school, compared to 56 percent of nonrural students.

This study captures insights from rural students and the adults who support them from 10 schools across rural Oregon.



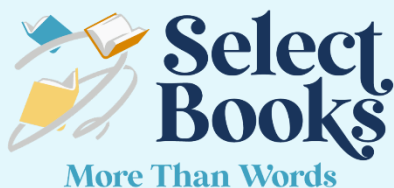

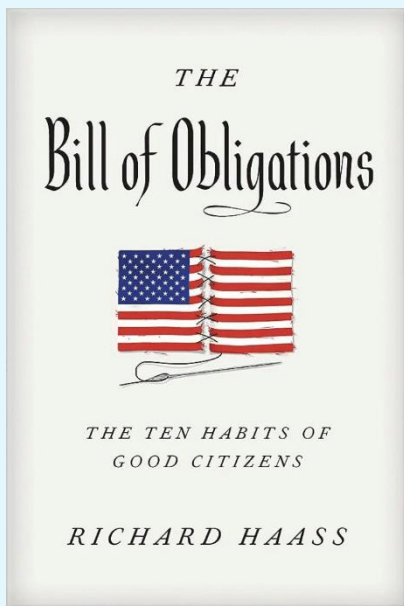
