We had a daily average of around sixty people, twenty of them being minor children. Twenty of the sweetest, kindest, most polite, and grateful kids around. They bring us, on the staff, so much happiness. We hosted a make your own pizza event that was a huge hit and brought lots of smiles. Our plan is to have a weekly event for the children, including crafts, cooking, and games. A fun weekly break for the kiddos and the staff!

Mid-month was a bit rough as the whole town was frozen over. Columbia Inn remained staffed throughout the storm, with staff walking (sliding) to work, braving the drive, or with the muchappreciated rides from the Astoria Police Department. CCA was also able to open an emergency shelter for four nights during this time, again with the help of Astoria Police Department's safe rides.

Unable to travel to pick up meals during the storm, the staff prepared meals in house for the guest. These "home-made" meals brought as much joy to the staff preparing them as they did to the folks who were eating them. This led us to make the decision to put the meal pick up on hold and attempt to make the meals here for now. So far it has been a huge success, bringing lots of happiness to the guest and staff. We have had some visiting "chefs" who have

prepared some amazing meals! It's truly been a highlight of the month for all involved.

Unfortunately, we lost a young man to an accidental overdose in January. All the proper procedures were followed, and staff did everything they could. Devasted and heartbroken, the staff rallied around each other, offering love, support, words of encouragement and always a



listening ear. CCA and their board offered support and insured that the needs of the staff were all met, community partners reached out, there was an outpouring of kindness when we really needed it.

Through the ups and downs of January we learned a lot, about ourselves, each other, our community partners, and sadly the unprecedented Fentanyl crisis.
